Welcome to Northern Pegasus Bay

Northern Pegasus Bay stretches north of the Waimakariri River along the sandy and pebbly beaches of the Waimakariri and Hurunui Districts to the Amberley Rocks. The Bay is a complex and beautiful natural environment with river mouths, estuaries and extensive sand dunes comprising a range of important natural habitats. It is also home to the beach communities of Kairaki, The Pines Beach, Woodend Beach, Waikuku, Leithfield Beach and Amberley Beach. Local residents and visitors enjoy the Bay for its environment and the wide range of recreational activities it has to offer.

- · The Ashley Rakahuri Estuary,
- · The Kowai and Waipara River mouths'.
- · Lagoons in from the beaches including: Mimimoto Lagoon (south of Woodend Beach), Leithfield Beach Lagoon, the Ashworths Ponds, Pegasus Town wetlands and the Tutaepatu Lagoon (south of Pegasus Town).

These areas are the food gathering supermarkets for most of our river and coastal bird species and need protection from activities such as four wheel driving, trail-biking and uncontrolled dogs.



Kairaki, Woodend, Waikuku, Leithfield and Amberley Beaches. Free camping is not permitted along the beach or on the





- · Amberley Beach has a short cycling track to the Waipara River Mouth. If you cross the river a four wheel drive track leads to the Amberley Rocks.
- The Kowai Track runs from the Leithfield Hotel to Leithfield Beach.
- · The Tutaepatu Trail links Waikuku Beach to Woodend 3each.
- · Further developments will improve links along the Ashlev River and between Woodend and Kairaki Beaches.

There are several options: surfcasting along the beach front, white-baiting at the river mouths, and salmon fishing particularly at Kairaki Beach. Fishermen have the same access rules as for vehicles, though a permit system operates in the white-bait season at the Ashley River Mouth (refer to Waimakariri District Council).

Vehicle Access



Beach access is provided for and controlled under the Waimakariri and Hurunui District Council Northern Pegasus Bay bylaws. Vehicles must stay below the last high tide line and travel at a maximum speed of 30kph, or 10kph within 50m of people who aren't in a vehicle. All vehicles must give way to walkers,

swimmers or horses. No vehicles may be ridden or driven in the fragile dunes.

While vehicles are allowed on much of the coast they are prohibited in several places (refer to map).

Horse riding is permitted along the beaches below the high tide line. However horses are prohibited from the following places:

- · The Ashlev Estuary
- · The Kowai River Mouth
- · The Waipara River Mouth

Refer to the maps for the prohibited areas. Horse riding is also prohibited through flagged areas during surf patrols.



Birdwatching

The best place for bird watching is the Ashley Estuary. This is regarded as one of the most important sites for birds on the East Coast, Colonies of spotted shags and white fronted terns live here. Other New Zealand species feed

here including banded dotterel, pied stilt and the endangered wrybill, black billed gull, black stilt and black fronted tern. Migrants and international travellers from Siberia which can be spotted include, grey tailed tatlers, whimbrels, eastern curlews, bar tailed godwits and red knots.

the Pegasus Bay Beaches, There is a surf club at Waikuku Beach which is patrolled during summer weekends. During the school summer holidays' lifeguards patrol all week at Waikuku, Pegasus Town, Woodend and
